

## Macquarie Building edges closer to construction completion

All that remains for construction of the \$150 million Dubbo Hospital Redevelopment Stages 3 and 4 is completing the intensive care unit on level 2 and minor works to internal corridors and public spaces.

The three-storey Macquarie Building features expanded and upgraded emergency and medical imaging departments on the ground level, a comprehensive ambulatory care centre for outpatient services on level 1 and a state-of-the-art critical care floor on level 2 with the

coronary care and intensive care units side-by-side.

What an amazing journey it has been! Stages 3 and 4 of the redevelopment started with the 34-bed surgical unit, which opened in 2018, followed by the dialysis unit, which opened in 2019, and will finish with the Macquarie Building.

A special thanks to all the hospital staff who provided invaluable input into the design and continued to provide quality patient care throughout the construction period.

### Car park construction well underway

Construction is well underway on the new car parks at Dubbo hospital as part of the NSW Government's \$30 million car park project.

Work is currently focused on in-ground works, services upgrades and work will start soon for piling and foundations of car park's structure.

The new car parks will deliver more than 350 new car spaces on campus to support the uplift of services from the hospital redevelopment and Western Cancer Centre. The car park project is expected to be completed next year.

### Western Cancer Centre on track for completion this year

Work is progressing well on the new cancer centre at Dubbo Hospital with construction now focused on the internal fit-out of the new double-storey building.

All major equipment is currently being installed including the linear accelerator for radiation therapy and the PET CT scanner for advanced diagnostic services.

Staff familiarisation tours have begun to prepare for the exciting move later this year.
